COAT OF ARMS

There is much symbolism in St. Mary's new Coat of Arms. The colour blue, the lily, and the rose are all associated with St. Mary, the patron saint of the University. The lily is also a symbol of Francophone culture and refers to the fact that the university is located on the site of the home of the Quebec-born Father Albert Lacombe. The wild rose is also the provincial flower of Alberta. The osprey, a local bird that nests on campus, is shown clasping a scroll symbolizing scholarship. The supporters, a bison and white-tailed deer, acknowledge that St. Mary's is located at the site of a former Blackfoot buffalo jump, and that deer appear frequently on campus. The University's motto at the bottom of the Coats of Arms, IN LUMINE TUO VIDEBIMUS LUMEN, is a Latin phrase from Psalm 36 meaning

"IN YOUR LIGHT WE SHALL SEE LIGHT."

St. Mary's is the first unaffiliated Catholic university in Western Canada and this year we celebrated our 28th year as an educational institution. The University became a degree-granting institution in 2004, and since then we have grown from strength to strength, offering affordable, fully accredited degrees in the Liberal Arts and Sciences, as well as a unique two-year after-degree Bachelor of Education (Elementary) degree specifically designed to train teachers for the Catholic school system. And although we have been a fully-fledged university for ten years now, we recently received permission from the Premier of Alberta to drop the word "College" from our name, a change that acknowledges our actual mandate in the post-secondary Campus Alberta system.






MESSAGE FROM DR. MARK CHARLTON, VICE-PRESIDENT ACADEMIC AND DEAN

DYNAMIC NEW PROGRAMS

St. Mary's University is pleased to announce three new degree programs: a Bachelor of Arts with a Major in Liberal Studies, a Bachelor of Science with a Major in Biology, and a Bachelor of Arts with a Major in History.



BACHELOR OF ARTS WITH A MAJOR IN LIBERAL STUDIES

The Bachelor of Arts with a Major in Liberal Studies is the first degree of its kind in Alberta. The program has been designed specifically for the 21st century student and job market.

Students entering university today are often interested in a number of subject areas or have yet to make a decision on their chosen field. This program allows students the maximum flexibility to discover and pursue their interests while completing a four-year degree. Young people today are unlikely to have one job for their entire work life. Instead they are more likely to pursue a career path that will require the application of job skills in a number of positions.

Students completing the Liberal Studies program will be able to pursue many career paths including journalism, management, marketing, public relations, human resources, education, social services, research and analysis, government and industry. The program also provides an excellent foundation for further studies at the graduate level in a number of fields and for professional programs including law.





BACHELOR OF ARTS WITH A MAJOR IN HISTORY

The Bachelor of Arts with a Major in History provides students with a broad understanding of the historical foundations and cultural dimensions of the world they live in. Students will develop the skills needed to uncover and analyze the events, processes and ideas which shape the past, and appreciate how an understanding of the past helps inform the present and the future.

This degree will provide students with excellent training in processing information, conducting research and critical investigation and analyzing data, skills that are in high demand in fields such as law, journalism, public service, archives and museums, librarianship, teaching and management.



BACHELOR OF SCIENCE WITH A MAJOR IN BIOLOGY

Drawing on the existing strength of St. Mary's in the Liberal Arts, students in the Biology program will be broadly educated, grounded, practically-minded thinkers able to work across and outside disciplinary boundaries.

The Bachelor of Science with a Major in Biology is unique in Alberta. This program offers students opportunities not found at larger institutions. The degree draws on St. Mary's strengths in the liberal arts, the centrality of ethics and social justice to our mission, our small class-size and intimate environment, and our proximity to and ties with Fish Creek Provincial Park.

This program prepares students for a wide array of careers, with roles from agriculture to biomedical laboratory research and from environmental consulting to veterinary medicine. Students completing this program can also pursue graduate work in biology, business, education, law, or medicine.

RESEARCH AT ST. MARY'S UNIVERSITY

By establishing a highly collaborative and interdisciplinary research culture, St. Mary's provides an extraordinary learning experience for our students; establishes real partnerships with the community; and contributes to the welfare of humanity and to our understanding of the world. ~ Dr. Norman Knowles

Examples of our research culture in the past year at St. Mary's include, 27 scholarly publications, 19 conference papers and 22 community presentations by our faculty. Faculty Research Grants were awarded to Dr. Syrnyk for her project "Sharing Knowledge, Seeding the Future: Investigating Infant Word Comprehension and the Nurture Approach" and to Dr. Tara Hyland-Russell for her project "Well-Being and Social Skills among Participants in a Radical Humanities Program for Marginalized Adults." Two St. Mary's students were hired as faculty research assistants through the Canada Student Jobs program.





STUDENTS ENGAGED IN RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION

An important feature of a small liberal arts university like St. Mary's is the opportunity for undergraduates to both engage directly in research with faculty and to see their work published, a rarity in research-intensive universities where the focus is on graduate students. This happens at St. Mary's in several ways. Each of our degree programs has a senior capstone course which requires students to undertake a significant research project. At the end of the year, students have the opportunity to present their research in a day-long academic conference that is open to the public. In addition, students are encouraged to submit their research papers to *The Attic*, an undergraduate academic journal. The editors

of *The Attic*, Dr. Gayle Thrift and Dr. Jocelyn Williams, carefully review all of the submissions and select the best for publication.

Through the Literary Guild, students wishing to develop their skills in poetry and creative writing are mentored by St. Mary's writer-in-residence, Eugene Stickland. The best selections are published annually in the Literary Guild's annual journal, *Sightlines*. Students also have the opportunity to participate in research with faculty during the summer months resulting in co-authorships once the work has been completed and submitted for publication.

The Learning Centre offers diverse programs and services that foster our students' academic success. Rafael de la Peña, Director of the Learning Centre, encourages all students to meet with peer mentors at the Writing Centre to work on their academic writing or course content comprehension. During orientation, first-year students sign a 12-strategies commitment to academic success and are invited to attend success strategies seminars throughout the academic year. Our Study Room offers a quiet space, with access to printed and online resources where students can work individually or in groups. With five individual workstations, our Testing Services room is available for accommodated exams and external proctoring.

Being on campus and experiencing St. Mary's community atmosphere is the best way to showcase what we can offer students. HUMANITIES 101



Humanities 101 has been supported by generous donations from the community totaling over \$200,000. The most recent donation came from the Ursuline Sisters of Chatham, Ontario, who gifted \$120,000 in September 2014. Community support for Humanities 101 was in response to St. Mary's students stepping forward with a commitment of \$25,000. Our students led the way in providing access to a great university for those who otherwise would be unable to attend.

In 2014, St. Mary's added its third team, Cross Country Running, to the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference (ACAC). This step is important as we continue to grow as an institution and an athletic department. The cross-country running team has been competitive in their first season and has shown consistent improvement in each race. New head coach Steve Adams, who has his NCCP Level 3 in distance, is doing great work with our student-athletes.

Both the men's and women's basketball teams have new coaches and players and are looking forward to a positive 2014-2015 season. Steve Shoults (NCCP Level 3) is the new women's head basketball coach and Dane Morris (NCCP Level 3) is the new men's head basketball coach. The Department of Athletics and Recreation has also added some new faces to the staff this year including Rhonda Thiessen, Fitness Manager, who is also a certified personal trainer and Lindsay English, our new Recreation Coordinator/Assistant Athletics Director.

Last year the SLC were successful in raising \$13,000 for this impactful program. CONVOCATION

Convocation is a day to celebrate the achievement of our students and to thank the great many professors and staff who have worked so hard to provide a memorable educational experience.

On June 13, 2014, St. Mary's University was proud to confer degrees on 90 students at our Convocation Ceremony at St. Mary's Cathedral. Graduation is one of the most exciting days in a student's life and the St. Mary's community was thrilled to share the day with a record number of graduates.

Mr. Joseph Ladouceur was named this year's Honorary Fellow. Mr. Ladouceur is the eleventh recipient of this designation which recognizes individuals who exemplify the values, principles and vision of St. Mary's University. Mr. Ladouceur's involvement with the university began in 1996, and he occupied many volunteer roles in the organization over the years, including Treasurer and Vice-Chair of the Board of Governors. He became Chair of the Board in 2005, a position which he held for seven years.

Each year, the graduating student with the highest cumulative Grade Point Average is awarded the Gold Medal. This year, Aaron Ellsworth was awarded the Gold Medal during the Convocation ceremony. Aaron graduated with a Bachelor of Arts with a Major in English, and a perfect 4.0 GPA. Aaron attributes his outstanding academic success to St. Mary's small, caring environment. At the age of fifteen, Aaron was diagnosed with severe depression and anxiety. The challenges he faced pursuing an academic career while struggling with a mental illness were often debilitating. The biggest struggle he faced was coping with his negative view of himself. However, it was through the supportive and encouraging relationships with his professors, and the close-knit community of St. Mary's students, that he began to perceive himself the way his professors and classmates do: intelligent, capable and compassionate. "The faculty and staff at St. Mary's create an environment of support and encouragement, and the students flesh it out," said Aaron. Aaron is now working on his Master's degree in English and hopes to one day obtain his PhD and become an English Professor, so that he too can support future students' academic careers, the way he was supported at St. Mary's.

As the CWL Chair for Catholic Studies, Dr. Duggan has a mandate to enhance the academic culture within St. Mary's through teaching and research and to communicate the vitality of St. Mary's to the community at large through lectures and workshops. In the past year, he participated in the annual conference of the International Society of Deuterocanonical and Cognate Literature at the University of Haifa in Israel, where he presented a paper on "Emotions that Produce Life and Death in 1 Maccabees."

On behalf of St. Mary's University, Dr. Duggan partnered with Rabbi Shaul Osadchey of Beth Tzedec Synagogue to produce a two-day program entitled "Illuminated Texts: An Exhibition." Dr. Duggan interpreted the calligraphy and illuminations of the Saint John's Bible at Beth Tzedec while, at St. Mary's, Rabbi Osadchey displayed a handwritten Haftorah and lectured on the calligraphy of handwritten Hebrew scrolls. Subsequently, Dr. Duggan collaborated with Beth Tzedec Synagogue and the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews in Calgary to sponsor a four-day lecture series by Dr. Amy-Jill Levine of Vanderbilt University on the theme, "Sibling Rivalry: Cultivating Shalom in Judaism and Christianity."

SPEAKER SERIES

Each year, St. Mary's University is pleased to host a series of free, informative and thought-provoking lectures given by prominent scientists, academics, and artists for our community members. The St. Mary's Speakers Series celebrated its tenth year in 2013-2014 and showcased four very knowledgeable speakers.

Dr. Linda Henderson presented the first lecture of the series entitled "Photo Essays: Method and Memoir." In March, First Nations writer Richard Van Camp captivated an audience with his world-renowned storytelling talent as he demonstrated the power of the oral and written story. In April, St. Mary's Playwright-in-Residence, Eugene Stickland, spoke about his journey to become a playwright and journalist. The series concluded this past September with iconic broadcaster Jay Ingram, who explored the Science of Alzheimer's and answered questions such as, "Where did the disease come from?" and "Why is it suddenly at epidemic proportions?"

Over 600 community members enjoyed these free lectures.



DR. ALLAN MARKIN RECOGNITION DINNER

On November 5th, 2013, St. Mary's University hosted a major recognition ceremony in honour of Dr. Allan Markin to acknowledge his \$20 million-dollar lifetime gift to the university. The event opened with an address by Calgary's Mayor Naheed Nenshi and greetings from former Premier Alison Redford.

The evening, chaired by Mr. Guy Turcotte, CEO of Stone Creek Resorts, began with an introduction of Dr. Markin, outlining his significant success as a businessman and philanthropist. As Mr. Turcotte noted, Dr. Markin not only donated funds to the university, but also significant time and leadership. And just as important, "he called on other individuals to become benefactors of St. Mary's, myself included." Indeed, at every stage of development, Dr. Markin has been a driving force for St. Mary's, promoting the value of a liberal arts education, recognizing the benefits of a smaller university, encouraging change and growth and even attending as a student. His contagious enthusiasm continues to attract many other supporters to the school.

In his address to the sold-out crowd of 350 people, Dr. Gerry Turcotte, President of St. Mary's noted: "We need to be clear. There would be no St. Mary's story if it weren't for Allan Markin. His role in the ongoing growth and development of the university has been critical and inspirational."

Dr. Allan Markin responded by saying, "I am here tonight because I care deeply about St. Mary's University, and have done so for almost 20 years. Of all the projects I have had the pleasure of supporting, I would have to say that St. Mary's is possibly the most satisfying. In some respects it is a small project, but it has had a more significant impact than even I could have imagined. Small is beautiful. Small can change lives; it can change fortunes. St Mary's has changed lives and futures; it opened up learning opportunities for all students; it has transformed the educational landscape in Calgary. And as you heard in the video, it has changed my life."

With a steady increase in enrolment of almost 40% in the last two years alone, St. Mary's is reaching its physical capacity, creating a need for expansion. When that happens, Dr. Turcotte made clear that the university would name a future campus building in Dr. Markin's honour. A grateful Dr. Markin responded to this announcement by saying, "Despite what you may think, it is not easy for me to put my name to something in such a public way. I need to believe. And I need to hope for even better. That's how I feel about the university: I believe in it."

On the 4th of October 2012, St. Mary's University celebrated the arrival of the Saint John's Bible. This magnificent work, the first illuminated manuscript commissioned by Benedictine Monks in over 500 years, is the culmination of 16 years of painstaking labour. Handwritten in seven volumes, the project boasts the artistic direction of one of the world's greatest calligraphers, Donald Jackson, Senior Scribe to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's Crown Office, and some of the most remarkable artists working today.

The original edition, produced by Saint John's University in Minnesota, is written

on vellum. Only 299 facsimile editions have been produced from this edition and St. Mary's became only the second university in Canada — and the only one in Western Canada — to own a set. The works have been hand-treated with gold and platinum leaf, and are over three feet tall by two feet wide.

St. Mary's was able to purchase these wonderful volumes through the generosity of a number of key donors: Gerry and Anna Maier, Stan and Marge Owerko, John Cordeau and Carolyn Phillips and an anonymous donor. More important, our

donors funded not just the purchase of the volumes, but provided funding to ensure that we could take these works out into the community, and bring the community to St. Mary's.

Since the volumes arrived, thousands of people have visited St. Mary's, to attend scholarly lectures on arts, religion and sacred texts; to take our new **CERTIFICATE IN SACRED ARTS**; or to learn about calligraphy and book production. This has been a transformational gift, by inspired donors, that has contributed to the university in a significant way.





SAINT JOHN'S BIBLE AND SACRED ARTS

To celebrate the arrival of The Saint John's Bible, St. Mary's University launched a series of workshops and courses focusing on the Sacred Arts. Courses are offered in a wide range of topics, including painting, iconography, calligraphy, manuscript illumination, stained glass making, and Gregorian chant. Participants can gain insight into the principles that underpin the great traditions of sacred art, while learning skills and techniques to create a contemporary artwork of their own. Students taking the workshops can qualify for the newly-created Certificate in Sacred Arts-Foundations.



One of St. Mary's most popular events is the **GHOST TOUR AND BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION** held each year on St. Mary's birthday, September 18. Selling out the last three years, hundreds of people in the community join us on campus to tour scenes illustrating St. Mary's history from the unique perspective of spirits and ghosts that once walked our grounds. Following the tour, guests celebrate St. Mary's University's birthday with hot chocolate, cupcakes, and a remarkable fireworks display that can be seen for miles.





STRATEGIC PLAN

As one of the fastest growing post-secondary institutions in Alberta, St. Mary's recognized the need to revisit our Strategic Plan and re-imagine our priorities for the years ahead. In 2013, we hired a consultant, gathered the people, and put everything on the table. The result was our 2013-2018 Strategic Plan – a document that outlines our target for optimal growth – 2000 students by 2025 – and our focus: on students, teaching, research, financial sustainability and the development of an environmentally dynamic campus.

St. Mary's University has identified six strategic directions in our 2013-2018 Strategic Plan:

- Promote and support a student-centred learning experience;
- 2. Promote and support exceptional teaching and learning;
- Establish long-term sustainability;
- 4. Establish and implement a comprehensive human resources plan focusing on the whole person: mind, body and spirit;
- 5. Implement the university expansion plan; and
- 6. Preserve the integrity of the campus environment.





SITE PLANNING

St. Mary's University is planning a campus expansion to address the unprecedented growth in student enrolment and meet the needs of our students. This expansion will include residences, classrooms, a gymnasium and associated infrastructure, all built around a central quadrangle, and encompassing the historic features of the site. The overall plan is guided by a number of principles that were developed in consultation with students, faculty and staff. The principles respect the unique location adjacent to Fish Creek Park and focus on enhancing the sense of community that defines St. Mary's University.

We are entering a very exciting phase of the project, where we will build on the concepts developed to date to finalize building locations, sizes, contents, and the 'look' of the project. The initial work will include retaining a design team to complete this portion of the design, as well as to develop a project execution strategy and cost estimates. We expect to complete this work in early 2015, and then move to the funding stage, before the actual start of construction.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone at St. Mary's for the efforts and input to date. MESSAGE FROM DEBBIE OSIOWY, VICE-PRESIDENT BUSINESS AND FINANCE




